- Before teaching in China disregard a "stereotypical" Asian student view
  - Kids are just kids the world over
  - Most live on campus & very independent
    - Usually from a young age
  - Ages 18-21
  - Many trilingual (if not more)
  - "Sage on stage" educational upbringing
    - Could lead to initial plagiarism education
  - Digital natives
    - Advanced smartphone use and bring own laptops to classes

## Teaching Infrastructure

- Learn as much about it as you can before you arrive
- Can be very mixed from chalk to WWW
- May/may not have heating or air-conditioning
- WiFi can be patchy or burdened by many connections
- A student may be the "monitor" holding room keys
- Accessibility to rooms may be very rigid
  - In some cases vacant rooms to be booked & paid for





## Hierarchical University Structure

- Big universities with multi-tiers of management
  - Takes organisation and planning for meetings
    - Especially if outside of your host school
      - Unlike FedUni
- Titles reflect status & power



## Get to know your students

- Do not be shy of socialising
  - You are only there for a short time
- Students will value the interaction
  - Chance to speak English
  - Cultural hospitality
  - Learn about different culture
- Respect lines are not blurred
  - But they may want to pay for your meal



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### Power distance/gap

- Western teaching style often has a closer power gap than Eastern
  - FedUni is known for close student interactions & support
- Students will need to adjust to our style of teaching
  - More conversational style teaching
    - And use of humour
  - We encourage and value questioning
  - We often mix more with students outside class times
  - Varied forms of teaching per lecturer
  - Think of internationalised examples





#### Language

- Mixed levels of English competencies
  - Conversational, written, comprehension etc
    - Conversational skills usually more mixed in proficiency levels
- Can be mentally taxing on a student and staff
  - Encourage short breaks and mixed teaching modes
- Many students transcribe notes
  - Before, during and after classes
  - May explain why they can be tired in the mornings
  - In class often using web-based translation tools



#### Language cont.

- Avoid slang and colloquialisms
  - At times though teach them and share
- When marking, focus on spelling & grammar, but look beyond for meaning and understanding





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# Competing student factors


- Other University classes & requirements
  - Compulsory classes outside of our degrees
  - Sporting commitments
  - Festivals
  - Local culture
    - The afternoon nap is highly valued
  - Avoiding the canteen rush





#### Social media

- Many Western social media apps/sites are blocked
  - Check your course resources
    - Bring as many resources as you can with you
    - Even some FedUni resources can be troublesome
- Look at alternative Chinese platforms
- Embrace instant messaging
  - Used by most students and staff
    - WeChat, QQ etc
  - Often used for official School communications





# Involve yourself in campus life

- Students around campus will often initiate conversation
  - To practise English and also to learn about your culture
    - Some though are very shy about talking to you
- Look for campus events and groups
  - Often sporting or national cultural events
- Look for "English corners" and clubs
  - Students from other schools & interests
  - Grant has judged English language competitions & plays
