## What is this document for?

The Bachelor of Psychological Science has two components: core psychology courses and elective courses (See Figure 1). All the core psychology courses are compulsory. This document is intended to help you select your elective courses.

This document is organised into two sections.

- **'About Electives'** outlines what electives are, and offers some guidance on selecting electives, as well as other important pieces of information.
- **'Suggested Elective Streams/Courses'** provides lists of possible elective courses and sequences for you to select, grouped into disciplines. It is not an exhaustive list of possible options for electives, but it is a great place to start.

## About Electives

### What are electives?

In HY5, an elective is any 15-credit point course offered by the university. The HY5 program structure requires that you complete eight elective courses: 4 in first year, 2 in second year, and 2 in third year (See Appendix A). You are encouraged to do at least some of your electives as an elective stream. An elective stream is a sequence of courses within the same discipline. For example, Community and Human Services or Criminal Justice are examples of disciplines that you could choose to do as an elective stream.

This document lists possible elective courses organised into streams. This should make it easier for you to select courses within a stream. However, you are not limited by the courses contained in these lists. Each School in the university provides lists of courses they offer, and provide Course Outlines for each, so you can read about them. You will find these lists on the Federation University website, under each of the schools, and in the Student Resources area.

### How do I choose electives?

There are plenty of options to choose from for your electives, which is great as it gives you a great amount of variety with what you can study, however all that choice can make choosing difficult.

We'd encourage you to select at least some courses in a stream of courses from one or two disciplines. This gives you the opportunity to 'value-add' to your degree by having another area or two of specialisation. Think about vocational interests, possible career pathways, or even general interests that you would like to explore and select courses in related areas that will enhance your academic transcript. If you are unsure, you can use your first-year electives to explore a range of different disciplines, and then you may choose to follow a particular stream for your second- and third-year study.

When you look through the lists of streams below, you will notice that the number of courses in each sequence varies. Thus, you may not be able to complete all your electives in a particular discipline. If so, you can pick courses from a second stream, or individual courses from streams, if you satisfy the pre-requisites.

Pre-requisites are courses you must have completed before you can complete your chosen course. Many courses, especially intermediate (coded 2000) and advanced courses (coded 3000) have pre-requisites. Thus, if there is a course you would like to do, you might have to do another course first. Additionally, some courses also have exclusions. Exclusions are courses that prevent you from enrolling into another course. For example, an exclusion for PSYCB 2105 is BEHAV 3004. If you have completed or are currently enrolled in BEHAV 3004, you are not permitted to enrol into PSYCB 2105.

### Important notes about choosing electives

- The options for electives vary between campuses, although any student can take online courses (ODL)
- Courses vary in how they are delivered
  - For example, some are fully online (ODL), some are a combination of online and face-to-face components, and a few have lectures and lab classes
- It is the students' responsibility to double check pre-requisites and exclusions
- Every effort has been made to ensure the course details below are correct. On occasion, however, some details may change
- The courses in each sequence may vary from year to year
