STUDENT SENATE REPRESENTATIVE PROPOSAL HIGHLIGHTS

THE SENATE RECOMMENDED THAT

The University provide a wider range of food items to meet all dietary requirements of staff and students

The University offer additional study support for 2nd and 3rd year STEM Courses

The University allow the use of haze effects in the theatres and make it easier for the production team to organise it

The University expand the number of majors in the Bachelor of Business BI5 Program

The University provide compulsory education relating to LGBTQIA+ and First Nations People to Senate members and International Students - Georgia font

The University explore the idea of a secondhand bookshop on campus

The University make it mandatory for lectures to be recorded

The Senate change the name of its Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Representative to "First Nations" Representative - Futura font

The University formally respond to concerns of Nursing Students tabled in the Student Senate Feedback Report presented at the IHW l&t committee held on 25 August 2022

AND THE UNIVERSITY

HAS UNDERTAKEN A MAJOR MENU EVALUATION AND GREATLY ENHANCED DIETARY OPTIONS AVAILABLE

The University recognised the need for STEM based support and will run PASS courses for a variety of STEM classes in 2023

Senate raised this with Facilities and Services and the use of haze was implemented successfully

Advised that the Bachelor of Business is currently being reviewed and reimagined to ensure quality teaching.

Has provided an Indigenous Cultural Awareness Module on Moodle and LGBTQI+ training opportunities for students throughout the year

Due to contractional agreements it is unable to sell 2nd hand Textbooks but will provide a space for a student run book fair to sell textbooks

Advised that the decision to record lectures is at the discretion of the lecturer

CONTINUES TO USE ABORIGINAL & TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER FOR GOVERNANCE PURPOSES, BUT FOR STRATEGIC AND OPERATIONAL THE TERM FIRST NA-TIONS WILL BE USED.

STUDENT SENATE REPRESENTATIVE PROPOSAL HIGHLIGHTS

THE SENATE RECOMMENDED THAT

THE UNIVERSITY INCLUDES BOTH SMB AND CAMP Street campuses separately from Mt Helen Campuses when running events in Ballarat

THE UNIVERSITY IMPROVE THE QUANTITY OR QUALITY OF LIGHTING AROUND ALL UNIVERSITY CAMPUSES AND RESIDENTIAL ACCOMMODATION AREAS AS REQUIRED

THE UNIVERSITY EXTEND CAFÉ OPENING TIMES AT THE GIPPSLAND CAMPUS IN CHURCHILL

THE UNIVERSITY TO REOPEN THE BAR AT ALL CAMPUSES

THE UNIVERSITY CORRECT ENROLMENT ISSUES IMPACT-ING ARTS STUDENTS

AND THE UNIVERSITY

HAS RECRUITED A SUPPORT OFFICER WITH TO HELP RUN EVENTS AT THE CBD CAMPUSES. THESE EVENTS WILL BE CONSIDERED SEPARATE FROM MT HELEN.

UNDERTOOK AN ASSESSMENT ON LIGHTNING CONDI-TIONS OF VARIOUS LOCATIONS AND HAVE BEGUN THE NECESSARY STEPS TO IMPROVE THE LIGHTNING

Has extended the Churchill Café closing times to 3:30PM from January 2023, but notes that there is not a demand to increase opening time at other campus's

WILL OPEN BAR'S ACROSS ALL CAMPUS'S IN 2023 AND HAS UPDATED THE LIQUEUR LICENCE TO FACILITATE THIS

Confirmed that This issue has been addressed and fixed.

OTHER STUDENT SENATE ACHIEVEMENTS FOR 2022

- Collaboration with International Student Committee to brainstorm ideas for events, promoting greater integration and friendships between internationals and domestic students
- Kaylan Drzycimski Hosted a 'thrift stall' at the Gippsland Campus
- Guurman Kaur, Chair of Student Senate spoke about the problems youth face on the Menzies Oration Panel
- Senate members, Guurman Kaur and Liam Crocker in Mt Helen and Chloe Bethune and Kaylan Drzycimski in Gippsland, met with the Vice Chancellor and Director in Vice Chancellor's office for strategy to discuss possible improvements to the University, as well as getting students back on campus, challenges and barriers
- Active involvement in sick pay guarantee press conference and raised a global issue by our chair
- Senate Member Liam Crocker created a survey about the student accommodation for Residential Students receiving 60+ responses. A report will be created and presented in 2023.
- A national leadership conference in Canberra attended by Chloe Bethune, the Vice Chair, representing the University.
- Gurmaan Kaur, Chloe Bethune and Thaniya Nesakumar presented awards at the Fed Awards at Mt Helen, Gippsland and Berwick respectively
