# *Crows:* Black Birds with Brains?

We've all seen or heard of *Are You Smarter than a Fifth Grader*, but current research suggests that eventually we may be able to do the same with crows.

Crows have always held a place within our culture. From Norse to Australian Aboriginal mythology, they have long been known as tricksters, carriers of information, and symbols of intelligence. And not without good reason.

At a university in Seattle, an experiment involved trapping and tagging a number of local crows in order to monitor their flight patterns and where they rested. In order to protect themselves from the crows scratching at them, the researchers wore masks, and because they were university students, they all wore the same creepy mask during the experiment. The researchers got the information they were looking for, but they also found some additional information they were not counting on.

A week after the initial part of the experiment, the researchers found that if they wore the masks used during the tagging process, they would be swooped and loudly cawed at by all of the crows in the area. People wearing different masks, however, were left alone. The researchers weren't just swooped by those crows that were involved in the experiment, they were also swooped by other crows that weren't involved in the experiment, meaning that not only had the crows involved memorised the 'face' that had caused them such a nuisance, but they had also passed this information on well enough to other crows so that they recognised and harassed the same mask.

If having their own language isn't scary enough, Candace Savage, a Canadian nature and science writer, comments that crows appear to have personalised dialect when communicating with each other, especially within their families. Meaning that to the trained ear, a crow from America could sound very different to a crow from Australia.





Despite their tendency to travel, crows have appeared to be incredibly family-driven. Crows in New York have been found to spend up to six of their ten- to fifteen-year lifespan living with their family in their nest. Even after they have left, the crows will occasionally come back and visit their parents.

New Caledonian crows are some of the most intelligent and active tool-users of this progressive species. In a study in 2002, two New Caledonian crows were presented with a tube of water where a treat was floating out of the crows' reach, surrounded by pebbles. After attempting to get at the treat, the crows then began working together to put the biggest pebbles into the tube, raising the water in order to get the food.

In 2009, during a test on their problem-solving abilities, Alex Kacelnik observed a New Caledonian crow, which had never been exposed to wire before, spontaneously bend a straight piece of wire so that it could get at a treat. This kind of problem solving hasn't even been seen in chimps or apes — who share their methods for problem-solving — placing crows closer to human beings in terms of raw problem-solving abilities.

So maybe next time you think about yelling at some crows or throwing rocks, reconsider. Not just because it's a horrid thing to do to any animal, but because with the way that these black birds are progressing, there's a good chance that that crow will remember your face, warn their family about you in their own personal dialect, and then organise a group to break into your house. I wouldn't take any chances, anyway.

## What I've Discovered from Constantly

Every time a holiday rolls around, I find myself picking up where I left off in my quest to learn a new language. Each time I have learnt something new and very interesting, which prompts me to consider a completely different language altogether and waste hours in the depths of the 'languages' corner of the internet. ## 1. There's no such thing as an 'easy' language to learn.

Perhaps you have also considered learning another language (other than English), and have been baffled by the many languages that exist. To narrow it down, you decide to Google 'the easiest language for English speakers to learn'. You make some interesting observations. You learn that English is one of the most hybrid languages in existence. You also discover that each language exists in a category within a network, and English is a Germanic language (more on this in a second). So you decide on a Germanic language, and then find yourself on a site like Duolingo. At first, the language seems simple enough, but then you realise that this language has just as many (or more) complicated grammar rules as English. So you give up, and begin a new Google search.

Despite anything a webpage might tell you, every single language that exists has its own rules and requirements (and exceptions to said rules), meaning that learning a language is not merely substituting English words for others; it requires a lot more effort.

## 2. Each language exists in a category in the 'mind-map' of languages.

Where a language sits in such a network depends on its history and its structures. English is part of the Germanic languages category and shares a lot of its structures with languages like Dutch, Danish, Norwegian, Swedish, Afrikaans, and German. However, it does not mean Germanic languages will be easier to learn than any other language (such as a Romance language like French or Spanish, or a Uralic language like Hungarian or Finnish) it just means that English as we know it is rooted in other Germanic languages.

Once I looked this up and found myself learning about the history of the English language, a rabbit hole opened leading me to the beginnings of England as a nation. Apparently some of the first peoples to colonise the British Isles were the Angles, Saxons, and Jutes who all spoke a version of a West Germanic tongue. Over time, their language blended and formed into various dialects as they settled into their own tribes and kingdoms. The most powerful were the Angles and Saxons (Anglo-Saxons) who spoke Old English. Then came the Vikings with their North Germanic tongue, which merged with the Old English, followed by the Normans (the French) who added to the new Middle English. Middle English evolved into Medieval English, which became Early Modern English, then Modern English, and finally the Late Modern English we know today. Attempting to Learn Another Language

## 3. You can learn a language for free without leaving the house.

While I knew that I could teach myself a language on my own, I was unaware of just how many language-learning resources exist. For example, there are entire web communities of people who come together for the sake of learning another language or two. Or three. Or four. These people are called 'polyglots' and are fluent (or aim to be) in several languages. There is a huge interest in online language learning, and if you do decide to learn another language, you will not be short on resources. Aside from the popular interactive language-learning websites and apps (such as Duolingo, Memrise, Babbel, Clozemaster, iTalki, and Busuu), there are hundreds of thousands of people who blog about languages. Even on social media and sites like Tumblr, a quick 'langblr' search will provide you with enough guides, study tips, links, and a lot more to keep you busy for quite a while. YouTube is also rich with channels whose sole purpose is teaching people a language (not to mention that you can find channels entirely in another language). Other popular options are finding TV shows or movies in your target language, TV shows with a familiar format (like X-Factor or The Voice), or get hold of translated Disney films.

So long as you have an internet connection, there really isn't any excuse for not learning another language (especially since most of these resources are free). I even read an article about how some people are taking advantage of Tinder to meet people they can practise their skills with.

## 4. Learning another language has so many benefits.

While learning a language is not the easiest endeavour, it offers many benefits. Learning a language exercises your brain; it improves your memory and your attention span, boosts creativity, and (some say) it can even delay the onset of Alzheimer's. Not only is it mentally rewarding, but you will also gain a deeper understanding of English and the world around you. This is because events and objects are described differently in other languages in ways that cannot truly be translated without losing meaning. By learning another language, you not only re-discover the world (using a new language can allow for a completely different perspective), but also develop a sense of another culture.

While it may seem daunting at first, and may be tricky, it will be a personal achievement that you worked toward, and something that will give you greater confidence in your abilities.














# **Interview with**

#### Why are you joining us at FedUni?



## What are your top tips for overseas study or travel in general?

## What I Hate about Facebook: A Modest Venting



#### Award for Outstanding Contribution to University Life

Recognising students who have dedicated their time to enhancing the FedUni experience. This student should be a strong representative of our values of support, inclusion and engagement. They have gone above and beyond to contribute to their fellow students' experience at Uni.

Examples of their contribution may include:

- Being a member or a supporter of Club/Societies in a significant way
- · Being engaged with issues affecting student life and making positive contributions to the constant improvement of the Uni
- Being a leading example to other students through peer support, motivation and inclusion of others

#### Award for Outstanding Community Contribution

Recognising students who have made a significant volunteer effort outside the University. This student will have a role or roles in the local/ national/international community's volunteering network. This student will embody strong values around community engagement. Examples of their contribution may include:

- Demonstrating commitment to a positive cause by volunteering countless hours of their own time to organisations/events
- Being a role model and outstanding member of the local/wider community

#### **The Unsung Hero Award**

Recognising the student who flies under the radar, but does amazing work in the Uni/wider community. This student is a positive role model to their peers and is someone who you think deserves extra recognition for the contribution they have made during their time at Uni. Examples of their work may include:

- Making an exceptional contribution to Uni life or the wider community by enhancing the wellbeing of others, providing engagement
  opportunities for other students or being a tireless advocate for a cause

There are a lot of services around the uni that aim to work with students to help them academically. I recently found out about Check Mate from a lecturer; while there is a very nice page that goes into great detail about the service that can be found on the FedUni website, it was the first time I had heard of it. Check Mate is basically an editing service where you can upload your assessment — essay or otherwise — and have it check for things like structure, referencing, spelling, and language choice, just to name a few.

You can upload your assessment at any time and you can expect to hear back from them within 24 hours. I decided to give Check Mate a try last month when I uploaded a film analysis I was ready to submit. I am sure that I am not the only student that gets to the point they are sick of looking at, let alone editing, their work and more than ready to send it off, errors and all. So, I uploaded my analysis, put the essay question in when prompted, and waited to see their reply.

I received the review of my assessment in under 24 hours, and I found the response pleasant and professional. They picked up on a few things such as a missing word, a sentence fragment, a couple of spelling mistakes, and the fact my conclusion was still in two parts because I had forgot to hit the backspace key. Having a fresh pair of eyes on your assessment is a great help, and it can also potentially help improve your mark. This is a service that I would highly recommend taking advantage of.

To Saitama, it seems there's nothing more frustrating. In a world where heroes are commonplace and organisations of heroes guard the general public from potential threats, Saitama's one goal is to find one enemy who can at least offer a challenge, all the while dealing with fellow heroes and their organisations.

A lot of shows try to trick you into doubting the protagonist's victory in battle, but in reality... you know they're going to win. *One Punch Man* basically skips the point where the show tries to convince you that the hero has got it tough and just gives you the result, not to mention the satisfaction, of watching the protagonist absolutely decimate their opponent. Okay, so he's pretty tough, but that's not to say that Saitama is a Mary Sue or a Gary Stu in any sense of the word. There are other places where he falls short; at one point a skewed ranking system deems his mental prowess poor which then is detrimental to his social rank. This becomes one of the major obstacles for him as he constantly has to fight against his reputation, so I suppose we can't say that *every* battle is truly an effortless experience for him.

The anime does a good job of laughing in the face of common tropes and clichés by embracing them in an over-the-top comedic way, which is where the show gets most of its charm. Saitama acts as a differential among an array of interesting and amusing characters as they build up the suspense, tension and story while he often calmly enters the scene and deflates the atmosphere with his total indifference.

Overall, the show does not disappoint. It's a good mix of comedy and action, and isn't afraid to use overcooked themes and have a poke at them while doing so. I recommend it to anyone who's sick of long, multiple-episode-length battles with too much talking, as this anime is good at just getting it done quickly, satisfactorily, and isn't afraid to have a laugh while doing so.

## Already a Classic: Views by Drake

Drake's first studio album in three years, *Views* follows the release of his hit singles including 'Hotline Bling', arguably the biggest and best song of 2015; 'One Dance' featuring Wizkid and Kyla; and 'Pop Style' featuring Jay-Z and Kanye West as The Throne. Despite having to compete with the surprise release of Beyonce's explosive album *Lemonade* on Tidal, just days before *Views*' set release date on Apple Music, Drake outshone 'Queen Bey'. While *Lemonade* has a few great songs, it's simply an overall okay album, whereas *Views* features one certified hit after the next. Every song on the album is outstanding in its own right. *Views* is a revelation. With unbeatable lyrics and get-stuck-in-your-head beats, it's the kind of album that sucks you out of your everyday life and into its world — whether that's the 6 or the 9, you decide.

I give Views four-and-a-half stars out of a possible five, and a prayer hands emoji. In Drake's own words, Views is "already a classic".



## **Top 3 'Geeked Out' Movies** as chosen by Federation University students by Dakota Richards

The Federation Generation have spoken. After venturing out to the university's Mt Helen campus and the FedUni Living residence, Jemacra Place, over the past week, I asked a range of students to pick their top five 'Geeked Out' movies. From those, a top three were decided:

#### 1. X-Men: Days of Future Past

This film was the most popular amongst the student community. In particular, the loop in time that allowed a crossover between the old characters in previous X-Men films, and the new was most favourable. Regarding the plot itself, the majority of the students surveyed said they simply enjoyed the battle scenes of the film.

The fact that a machine created to destroy all mutants, which in turn is also capable of destroying humans was, "A big point to make about humanity and the singling out of others who are different", one student said. In contrast to this, some felt the backstory of how they got to the present could have been portrayed better in the film. Having a notable cast that the students could identify with, including Hugh Jackman, Michael Fassbender, James McAvoy, and Peter Dinklage was also a factor as to why it was rated highly.





#### 2. Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban

The third instalment of the series was the top pick amongst the students due to "character selection and inclusion". For one student, it related to the characters, "Sirius and Lupin in particular. It also created the backstory for the future movies".

In contrast, they found the book-to-film adaptations disappointing and felt they didn't quite do the books justice. "The death of Dumbledore was portrayed differently in the films", while other characters were more prominent in the films "which weren't in the books".

#### 3. The Lord of the Rings Trilogy

The overall narrative and flow of the plot, as well as the battle scenes throughout the trilogy, were favourites amongst students. When asked about their favourite of the trilogy, *The Two Towers* was the favourite out of the three for the fact it didn't centrally focus on the character of Frodo, and it makes contrasts between the relationship of the dwarves and elves. A student found the Battle of Helm's Deep to be "humorous" regarding the dynamic that forms between Legolas and Gimli, with "Gimli not being able to see over the top of the walls, so Legolas gives him a crate in order to be able to see". In contrast to *The Hobbit*, one student stated that CGI was made less apparent in *The Lord of the Rings* as opposed to its newer counterpart, "*The Hobbit* gave the 'overdone' impression, whereas this was more effectively used for its time".

The question I want answered: Is being me, in this world enough to please?




