Three-stage plan for a safe start on campus

REVISED 18 AUGUST 2020 – VERSION 2 – STUDENTS

The following is the three-stage plan for Federation University Australia's transition to campus. The content has been developed from the university's <u>COVIDSafe Plan</u>, the Commonwealth government's *3-step framework for a COVIDSafe Australia* and directives from the Victorian Government and provides flexibility to respond to changes in government advice in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Introduction to Federation University Australia's COVIDSafe Plan

Federation University Australia is planning a gradual and safe transition to campus activities over an extended timeline into 2021 – to keep students, researchers, staff and everyone involved in our university community safe from the risk of COVID-19.

Our *COVIDSafe Plan* places a strong focus on the specific and unique activities of students, researchers and staff in each of our Schools and Directorates. It recognises that study online, working from home, and a tailored response to the cautious reintroduction of classes and practical activities, is crucial to determining the correct action to protect the safety of our communities and respond to local conditions.

Our three-stage plan for a safe start on campus

This document outlines the approach to implement our *COVIDSafe Plan* on campus, recognising that a cautious and flexible approach, adhering to evolving government regulations and with oversight and approval by senior leadership, will help reduce the risk the virus presents to us all.

COVID-19 represents an unprecedented and unpredictable public health risk in Victoria and, as we have seen in the media, the landscape and the subsequent government advice can change quickly. Our plan needs to be responsive and adaptable to these changes.

Formal review – Our three-stage plan will undergo a formal review every two weeks by the COVID-19 Transition Control Group (the TCG), which will look at the current government advice against the next steps in our plan, to allow us to prevent any unacceptable risks.

Activity-based risk assessments – There will also be a weekly review by the TCG of activitybased risk assessments from Schools and Directorates.



Principles

Federation University Australia makes the following commitments to its university community.

- To implement fully and methodically all Commonwealth and State Government requirements to stop the spread of COVID-19 and keep the community healthy.
- Plan an orderly, gradual and safe transition to campus process that complies with government requirements and the university's strategic and operational priorities.
- Place at the centre of our transition to campus process occupational health and safety and the equitable treatment of all members of the university community, especially those most vulnerable.
- Look beyond teaching activities and apply sector-based requirements to all entities on campus, including childcare centres, schools, sporting facilities, cafes and retail.
- Encourage the university community to download and use the COVIDSafe app to assist in contact tracing.

Approach

A cautious, methodical, needs-based approach to being on campus.

Structured planning. Student priorities. Concentrated campus cleaning. Physical distancing and face masks/coverings. Leadership and staff accountability.

- Work systematically and proceed with caution to ensure that we can pause and adapt to the evolving health situation and government requirements.
- Health and safety is paramount. Across all campuses we are conducting concentrated cleaning, increasing touch-point cleaning, and increasing the availability of cleaning supplies and hand sanitisers.
- Encourage staff and students to download and use the COVIDSafe app and get tested if they have any COVID-19 symptoms.
- Physical distancing must be maintained with specific notifications across our campuses to guide students and staff.
- If you can work from home, you must work from home.
- Using a needs-based approach to identify who <u>needs</u> to be on campus. Looking at the specific needs for every student, researcher and staff member in every course or activity delivered by Federation.
- Decision-making and risk assessment starts with our Schools and Directorates, which must apply their detailed knowledge to make safe, informed decisions about who is most needed on campus.
- University leadership via the TCG makes the ultimate decisions about operations.

Core responsibilities if you are needed on campus

- If you feel unwell, stay home, don't come to campus
- Practise physical distancing and wear a mask/face covering
- Frequently wash and sanitise hands
- Keep workspaces clean
- Download the COVIDSafe app
- Complete the COVID-19 Induction transitioning back to campus online module
